DARRYL FABICK OBITUARY: It is with great sadness to report that **Darryl Fabick** has passed away. He was such a valued member of STLRC. He will be greatly missed. He was a founder of STLRC, our treasurer, and posted every ride we did, changed or canceled on our website for many years.

Darryl Casper Fabick was born September 11, 1940, and he passed away on Friday, May 5, 2023.

Darryl is the son of Casper Frank Fabick and Yvonne Fabick. Darryl was married to Sara Frances Fabick and has one son, Christopher Darryl Fabick.

Darryl was a graduate of Lindbergh High School, attended Washington University, and served in the Air Force for four years working on guided missiles. He served as an adjunct professor at St. Louis Community College in various technology programs and worked as a Field Engineer.

Darryl and family were active members of the Carlyle Sailing Association, with Darryl serving as a club Commodore.

Darryl helped to create the St. Louis Recreational Cyclists (STLRC), an organization which has provided safe outings for many seniors in both biking and hiking since 2011. In his retirement, Darryl taught senior citizens computer skills, visiting their homes to help with installations and instruction. Darryl was an active volunteer with St. Louis Symphony Orchestra, and a supporter of Opera Theatre Saint Louis, Angels' Arms, and the Humane Society.

The family will hold a private Celebration of Life to honor Darryl.

In memory of Darryl Fabick from David Brown

Darryl Fabick

I do not recall when I first met Darryl. I know that he was a ride leader of the Turtles and Turbos at least as early as 2006 and probably earlier. I joined in about 2004. The Turtles and Turbos rode regularly during the months of the year that allowed for it. Our rides were planned a couple of months ahead as they were printed in a paper newsletter, *The Gateway*, that was published a few times a year. *The Gateway* was the official St. Louis newsletter of Hosteling International/American Youth Hostels.

After the tragic death of Mike Katz who was hit on his bike by a motorist in about 2005, I took over the website that he had started. I suspect that is when Darryl and I started working together. As time passed, we started posting rides on our website without requiring such a long lead time. I also knew him as a strong rider who rode with the Turbos most of the time while I rode with the Turtles.

Perhaps it was 2011 when HI/AYH decided to cease sponsoring our groups after the attempt to establish a youth hostel in St. Louis had not been successful. Several of us, Darryl and I included, decided to recover what we had lost by starting our own bicycle club. We found that we could buy insurance to protect our ride leaders if there was ever a lawsuit against one of them by affiliating with the League of American Bicyclists. That group of about ten people continued to meet regularly and build a bicycle club that would be a welcoming organization for riders who wanted the camaraderie

and exercise that such an organization could provide. We decided to use our website as the primary means of communication to announce our ride schedule and other club news. We also decided that the name "Turtle" was not how we wanted to present our club, so we adopted the name St. Louis Recreational Cyclists (STLRC).

The group of ten started calling ourselves the "Bicycle Committee" although we decided not to have a formal leadership structure. Perhaps Darryl and Wayne Marsh were the two dominant voices although the rest of us were very actively involved. Darryl agreed to be our treasurer and set up a mechanism that allowed him to piggy-back our account on his own checking account. As webmaster, I restructured the website to be more up to date with the technology of the day. Darryl and I designed a logo to go at the top of the home page and on business cards.

It was at this time that Darryl really became the primary person responsible for getting our club well-established. He decided to learn HTML, the raw language of website coding, so he could work on the website with me. It was my decision to use HTML rather than use one of the development tools as the current website uses. We decided to display ride listings in a format like the way they had been displayed in *The Gateway*. I created a template for Darryl to use that had a place for the date and time of the ride, the starting location, a description, contact information for the ride leader, and possibly a link to a que sheet for the ride. We allocated one webpage for each month and listed all of the rides for that month.

Darryl devoted a large part of his life to keeping up these ride listings. Ride leaders would send him the information for their rides, and Darryl would update the website with the listings. Since people sent him ride information in various ways, Darryl had to extract the information he needed and enter it into the template; this really complicated his task. However, Darryl's flexibility and dedication to the task made ride scheduling for ride leaders easy. They could send him new information or cancel a ride shortly before it was to take place. He was up and ready to take information as early as 6 AM. No one else was willing to do this task, but having a dynamic ride list was key to developing our club into the successful organization it became.

A feature of web-based ride listings was that we could include a link to a cue sheet for a ride; the ride leader did not have to print out enough cue sheets for all riders, and riders would know ahead of time what to expect on a given ride. As time passed, we amassed a collection of cue sheets that could be reused on subsequent rides. Darry organized this collection of cue sheets according to the starting point for the ride into what we called our "Cue Sheet Library". Now a ride leader could tell Darryl that they wanted to repeat a certain ride, and Darryl could copy the previous listing, appropriately modified, and include a cue sheet.

In about 2016, we decided to adopt a set of bylaws and elect officers. I became President, and Darryl was the Vice-President. At this time, he passed the position of Treasurer to Jim Cobb. Wayne Marsh, who had been serving unofficially as Secretary became the official Secretary. Fay Holdenried was the membership person. That group of people managed the club using a spreadsheet which we passed around as an email attachment to keep up with members and finances. Even after the formal structure was set, Darryl continued to be the person to update ride listings on the website.

In about 2018, I decided that I wanted to pass the webmaster role to a younger member. We were fortunate to find Jane O'Donnell who had just retired from teaching web development at a community college. She suggested using a calendar program to maintain our ride listings and that we could teach ride leaders to enter their own ride listings. Some ride leaders were reluctant to take on this role, but generally, it has worked fairly well with the help of Joe Kruchowski who has taken on much of

the website support role. Faye Holdenried became the President and Darryl resigned a Vice President.

The new way of operating the website allowed Darryl to pass the torch of maintaining the ride listings. Unfortunately, he was slowing down as he began to be afflicted with Parkinson's Disease. For a while, he was able to ride a tricycle, but eventually he had to give that up, too.

STLRC owes Darryl Fabick a debt of gratitude for his help in making this into a strong organization.

It breaks our hearts to announce the passing of our hero, the person we admired most in life, our dear mother/wife **Lynn F. Reiter** of St. Louis, MO. She treasured her friends and they were a godsend to her and her family during her battle with ALS.
